

RESUME OF MAYO J. GALINDO

Born in San Antonio, Texas, May 31, 1929, attended local schools and graduated from Central Catholic High School in 1946.

Attended the University of Texas from 1946-1952 and graduated with a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Political Science and Economics and a J. D. Degree in Law. Licensed to practice April 9, 1952, the oath of the Bar administered by his Battalion Commander.

Served in the United States Marine Corps 1952-54 and upon release entered private practice until February 1956, when he became an Assistant City Attorney under the tutelage of former City Attorney and later Chief Justice of the Fourth Court of Appeals, Hon. Carlos C. Cadena, deceased. Left that office to obtain a more divergent experience and became an Assistant Criminal District Attorney January 1, 1959, and in that thirty month period prosecuted misdemeanors and felonies of all nature, presented cases to grand juries and served as a special assistant to the United States Attorney in the Northern District of Texas to assist in the prosecution of the celebrated John Milton Addison uranium fraud case.

Judge Cadena would require all assistants working in the trial section to be proficient in the investigation of adverse matters, research the legal problems, plead and litigate them as well as conduct the appellate process. During his tenure as city attorney it was a custom and practice for the attorneys to conduct all phases of any legal controversy assigned him.

More specifically, as an assistant city attorney it was his duty to represent the city's interests before the Fire and Police Commission then constituted, to defend tort actions together with Mr. Crawford Reeder and ultimately to take charge of litigation for the land division which was then blooming into full scale.

Served as Chairman of the San Antonio Municipal Civil Service Commission from 1967-1973 and as Chairman of the San Antonio Fire and Police Civil Service

Commission for one year (1987). Served as prosecutor for the Grievance Committee for the 20th Congressional District of Texas in 1967-69. He further served on various committees at the State Bar level and for the San Antonio Bar Association some of which were the State Bar Committee for the Rendition of Legal Services to Indigents in civil and criminal matters, Liaison Committee between the Fourth Court of Appeals and attorneys, committee to select and approve candidates for admission to the Bar, former Chairman of the San Antonio Plan Committee and member of the Committee for Continuing Legal Education and Professional Skills.

He represented the City of Live Oak for 41 years, the City of Hill Country Village for 19 years, and the City of Bulverde for five years as well as other municipalities.

Authorized to practice before all Texas courts, the U. S. District Court for the Western District of Texas, the Fifth U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals and the United States Supreme Court.

He is a lifetime fellow of the Texas Bar Foundation and enjoys an "AV" rating in the Martindale-Hubbell Directory. (Lawyer with high legal ability and high recommendations – embraces faithful adherence to professional standards of conduct and ethics of the legal profession, professional reliability and diligence, and standards relevant to the attorney's discharge of his or her professional responsibilities.)

He has represented cities in defense of civil rights claims against their police officers, land use cases involving claims for inverse condemnation through the trial and appellate level, has also represented cities in utility rate making litigation and has drafted zoning and subdivision ordinances as well as a substance abuse testing policy for municipal employees.

In previous years he successfully defended causes in the federal courts involving alleged excessive force by police officers for cities he represented and has also successfully handled the trial and appeals of inverse condemnation claims which were

asserted against the City of Hill Country Village in a prolific case which lasted for seven years.

In 1991 he and Attorney Barney Knight represented the City of San Antonio as retained private counsel to successfully uphold the election to abandon the Applewhite Reservoir \$180,000,000 project.

As a member of the Fourth Court of Appeals Liaison Committee he spent a year researching and writing the history of the Fourth Court of Appeals which was published as part of the Court's Centennial Anniversary observed in September, 1993.

Experience in Arbitration Process

He has been involved in the arbitral process since its inception, both in litigation and in grievances to arbitrators. He is acquainted with the history of the collective bargaining agreements with both the San Antonio Firefighters and the San Antonio Police Department. He has represented firefighters and police officers in disciplinary proceedings and has been involved professionally in matters arising over the interpretation, application and enforcement of those agreements. He has also rendered opinions to management concerning matters which were the subject of grievances.

Together with Houston Attorney Claude Treece, he represented SFX Entertainment, Inc. in litigation to regain its canceled Special Use Permit for the construction of the present outdoor Verizon Amphitheater in Selma, Texas. At the request of the City of San Antonio, he authored two opinions on the limited issue whether the initiative-referendum process applied to the previous PGA Hotel Resort proposal over the Edwards Aquifer Recharge Zone.

Served as a member of the Professional Enhancement Committee, a division of the Local Grievance Committee whose primary function is to assist attorneys who have been disciplined in the rehabilitation process so they may continue resumption of their law

practices under conditions imposed by that body. The committee was recently disbanded due to lack of statutory funding.

Recently he represented the City of New Braunfels Ethics Commission in the determination of an ethics complaint filed against one of its council members, and at the request of the District Attorney for the 81st Judicial District has litigated quo warranto proceedings to remove public officials from office.

He has argued approximately ninety (90) appeals in appellate courts.
